



Flora Thompson (1876–1947)

A hundred years ago in 1916, Flora Thompson, author of *Lark Rise to Candleford*, arrived in Liphook where she was to spend the next twelve of her seventy years as the postmaster's wife.

Many will have seen her work adapted as a Sunday evening BBC TV series, but she found fame only in the last few years of her life. Her memories of childhood times in north Oxfordshire published in her book were written more than fifty years after the events they portrayed.

This year we commemorate the centenary of her arrival in Liphook with a tour of the play 'Lark Rise' written by Keith Dewhurst based on the book, and first performed at the National Theatre in London in 1978 'in promenade' with live music. It has become popular with schools and amateur dramatic societies since then.
